

Process to assess principles, standards and modalities for supporting indigenous peoples' tenure rights and forest guardianship

Objetive and agenda

The main objective of the meeting was to formally establish the Reference Group and to discuss and approve the Inception Report, which outlines scope, methodology and timeline of the assessment process. The Agenda of the meeting was as follows:

- 1. Round of introductions.
- 2. Selection of co-convenors of the Reference Group and moderator of the meeting
- 3. Brief introduction to the Pledge to support Tenure Rights and Forest Guardianship of Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities, and the related assessment process
- 4. Discussion and approval of Inception Report, including methodology and process action plan

Selection of co-convenors

The co-convenors will work with the consultants to:

- Prepare the Reference Group meeting (agenda, materials etc.)
- Assist in outreach to and consultations with members of the Reference Group, in particular within their region/constituency
- Address any concerns and needs that may arise in the process

It was decided to appoint an indigenous co-convenor per region and one co-convenor from the donor group. The following co-convenors were selected:

- Gam Shimray (Asia)
- Jesús Amadeo Martínez (Latin America)
- Casey Box, (donor group)
- Given busy schedules, the African members will still consider whether Maimouna Umarou or Joseph Itongwa is best placed to serve as co-convenor.

Comments to the assessment process

The consultants provided a brief introduction to the assessment process, and the approach, methodology timeframe etc., as outlined in the Inception Report. The Reference Group provided the following comments for the consultants to consider in the process:

Framing

- The assessment must depart from the premise that indigenous peoples manage crucial territories and forests. Hence, in the context of climate crisis, indigenous peoples are donors of life.



Consequently, indigenous peoples are not 'recipients' or 'beneficiaries' but rather strategic partners and allies in the protection of the world's biodiversity and environment.

 Indigenous peoples' contributions to combating the climate crisis should not only be recognised in international declarations but also reflected in terms of funding, which should be directed at establishing the enabling conditions that allow indigenous peoples to provide those contributions.

Focus and priorities

- The Pledge is focusing on tropical and subtropical forests, but some types of forests are invisible to donors. Moreover, biomes are inter-related and cannot be separated (e.g. highland and lowland forests are interconnected). Donors need to acknowledge this and have a more holistic approach to funding.
- The exclusive focus on countries that are eligible for Official Development Assistance (ODA) is a concern.
- Donors must be responsive to indigenous peoples' needs and priorities which has not always been the case. Free, prior and informed consent (FPIC) must be considered in the process.
- It is critical to include indigenous peoples who may have been excluded previously, such as those living in remote areas.

Funding mechanisms and management of funds

- Some donor requirements are impossible for indigenous organisations to fulfill. There is a need to bridge these two extremely different worlds, that share the same dream: to save Mother Earth.
- There is a perception among donors that indigenous peoples cannot manage funds. Indigneous peoples must demonstrate that they have the capacities. Where necessary, funds should be allocated to strengthen capacities.
- There is a need to establish funding mechanisms by and for indigenous peoples to provide direct access to funding. Such mechanisms should be established at the global and/or regional levels and cater for the specificities of each region.
- The assessment should include a review of previous and existing funding mechanisms and learn from these.
- Existing channels of bilateral and philanthropic donors should be improved and provide more flexibility. Accountability should focus on results and not only receipts.

Inclusion

It is important that the process is inclusive of youth, women and persons with disability. These
groups face particular challenges and it requires additional considerations to bring them on board,
leaving no one behind.

Accountability and coordination

 Communication and transparency are paramount in the assessment process and for establishing accountability towards communities. The consultants must provide Reference Group members with the necessary information and materials to facilitate their communication and accountability towards their constituents.



- The assessment must provide conceptual clarity and elaborate more on what is meant by principles and standards. It could, for example, be useful to provide a glossary of concepts and categorise different types of funding mechanisms.
- It is important to communicate clearly about the assessment process (including its focus and scope) and coordinate with other groups that are discussing fundings mechanisms and modalities (e.g. GATC and the indigenous caucus under the Convention on Biological Diversity).

Operation of the Reference Group

- The operation of the Reference Group is currently aligned with and limited to the timeframe of the assessment process undertaken by Charapa Consult (concluding in September 2022). Before the conclusion of the assessment process, the Reference Group will discuss if and how to proceed, beyond the timeframe of the assessment process.
